

# RAYMOND HECHT

German record holder 1994 to 2017 at 92.60  
World Ranked #2 in 1995, 96 and 97.  
European Championships Bronze medalist 1998  
7 competitions over 90 meters  
4th place finisher: Olympics 1996 and 2000  
World championships 1999 and 2001

# WILLIE BANKS

Stunned the track and field world in June, 1985 when he triple jumped a world record 58-11.5 to win the US Championships in Indianapolis -- a mark that stood for more than 10 years. He remains #3 and #6 on the respective all-time U.S. and World lists 33 years later. Banks was a 3-time Olympian ('80-'84-'88) and the originator of the now common hand clapping that takes place during many T&F events. Silver medalist in the first IAAF World Champ in '83 and inducted into the USATF Hall of Fame in 1999.

# THOMAS RÖHLER

Broke Raymond's German Record in 2017 with 93.90  
Olympic Champion 2016  
European Champion 2018  
World number one ranked thrower in 2018 and number 2 in 2017

# KENNY HARRISON

Famously captured the Olympic triple jump gold in Atlanta in 1996 with a 59-4.5 performance – an American record and #2 all-time globally at the time. Twenty-two years later, he still holds the Olympic record and only Christian Taylor (now the AR-holder) has beaten that mark. 1991 IAAF World Champ in the TJ and was inducted into the USATF Hall of Fame in 2013
